



Captain Doane Judged Best Horse in Westchester Show

Gimbel's Entry Awarded Grand Hunter First Prize

White Plains Entry Takes High Honors With New Jersey Horse Second; Show Ends.

THE three days of the thirty-sixth annual Westchester County Horse Show culminated Saturday with the championship classes. Bernard F. Gimbel's Captain Doane was judged the grand champion hunter of the show with Little Canada, owned by the Long Acre Farm of Warrenton, New Jersey, taking the reserve. Captain Doane had to his credit one blue ribbon, one second and one third, and although his performance in this particular show was decidedly indifferent, he won a comparatively easy victory.

Miss Carol Gimbel rode Captain Doane in the championship class. Little Canada, formerly owned by Robert Law of Purit Chester, took the championship in the heavy weight and middleweight hunter and jumper class. Little Canada, in the three days of the show, gave by far the most consistent performance of any horse in the show. This bay gelding, ridden by Miss Joan Adams, was the star of the Stamford show of last year. Five blue ribbons, four second and one third was the excellent record of Little Canada in the three days of the present show. His consistency is proven by the fact that of all the hunter he took in the entire show he had his discredit only two times; all his other jumps were clean.

The "Good Hands" Cup, presented by the A. S. P. C. A., was won by Miss Edith Anderson of Brookline, Miss Anderson showed excellent horsemanship throughout the show. Many of the horses which the rode received blue ribbons which awarded for his ability to show a horse to its best advantage. Both amateur and professional riders presented an example of technically perfect horsemanship.

The Champion Harness show of the show was judged by the Cassin's Eastern Model, owned by Mr. J. May Willetts. Mrs. Carl H. Hanna's brown gelding Sun Rise took the reserve. The Touch and Go Sweepstakes, besides offering the most valuable compensations in the show held the interest of the large gathering of society on Saturday afternoon. There were forty horses in this class and the jumpers as a whole, was not up to the quality of the former jumping class. Only two horses went the course clean. The class was won by Little Canada, owned by Bernard F. Gimbel, and went to Wayside Stable's Hill Hawk.

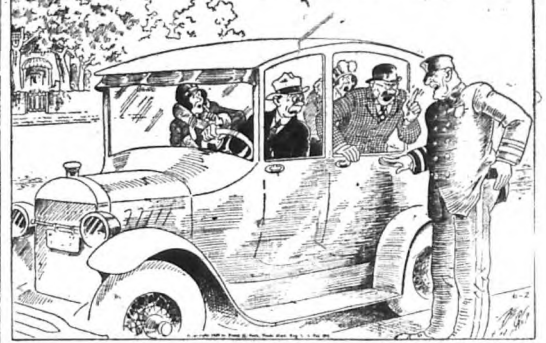
SALO IS PYLE DERBY WINNER

A CHAMPIONSHIP fight will take place at the State Armory on Thursday of this week when Willie Rose meets Freddie Monte for the bantamweight crown of the National Guard. Rose is the former title holder and Monte the present one. Willie won his crown from Benny Tell last winter and then took on Charlie Charneski by mistake and lost it again. Monte battled Abobo out of the title a few weeks ago in Brooklyn and still has it.

Rose has been fighting his way to the top even since he lost his bout with Charneski. He has been moving up the ladder steadily until he and Benny Brostoff came together for their classic at the local armory. Benny had been shouting for the title chance for months and they gave him Rose instead. Rose battered Benny for ten rounds and almost knocked him out. Brostoff was not in top form that night and had to be taken to the hospital afterwards but Rose showed his fighting ability and clearly won a chance for a go with the champion.

The result was that he was matched with Monte and the fight takes place this week. Rose is a rugged hard hitting fighter that can take any number of blows. Monte is a rather himself and strong for his weight. Once during his bout with Abobo the latter caught him with a terrific right to the head and he staggered but weathered the round and came back strong. This shows that he can stand as much punishment as Rose.
