

### UNPAID BILL PAVED WAY TO DIVORCE PLEA

Mrs. Margaret C. Hubbard Starts Action Against Husband; Justice Taylor Likely to Grant Decree

Wynant Hubbard, son of a well known New York family, forgot to pay his bills. News will probably have to forget that he had a wife, for yesterday Supreme Court Justice George H. Taylor, Jr. intimated that he would grant Mrs. Margaret C. Hubbard's plea for a decree of absolute divorce on the grounds of her husband's alleged infidelity.

The discovery of his alleged marital lapses came about through the forwarding of bills unpaid in Friburg to his wife.

After hearing the testimony of Mrs. Hubbard, said to be a resident of East Port Chester, a private investigator, and confidentially to Townsend Morgan, Mrs. Hubbard's lawyer, Justice Taylor reversed decision.

Mrs. Hubbard and her sister, Mrs. Marion C. Fryer, of Greenwich, Conn., were left alone in New York during August, 1928, they said, while "hubby," as he said, was away transacting some "important" business.

### GIVES \$150,000 TO ST. AGNES

Mrs. Elizabeth Otilie Meyer Bequeaths Large Sum to Local Hospital

St. Agnes Hospital for Crippled Children will receive more than \$150,000 in the terms of the will of Mrs. Elizabeth Otilie Meyer, widow of the late Peter F. Meyer, nationally known real estate auctioneer and one-time partner in a Richard Croker, Tammany Hall leader. The bequest was made known here when Simon O'Brien in New York signed an order directing Mrs. Meyer's estate to be opened.

With the death of Mrs. Meyer on July 2, more than \$100,000 of her husband's estate was released for charitable purposes. The widow received a life interest in the residuary estate of more than \$2,088,000. Mrs. Meyer specified bequests to seventeen charities and educational institutions, effective with the death of his wife.

Under Mr. Meyer's will one-third of the residuary estate, which according to a transfer tax appraisal made in May amounts to \$468,812, will go to St. Agnes Hospital, the Home for the Aged and the Little Sisters of the Poor. St. Joseph's Seminary and Fordham University are also named as beneficiaries.

Other specific bequests made in the will are to: St. Ann's for Consumptives, the Roman Catholic Orphan Asylum, Mount Sinai Hospital, New York; Yeshiva Ahrimim, servants for the Relief of Incurable Cancer, and St. Vincent's Hospital, each \$25,000. Fifty thousand dollars is left to the United Catholic Works; \$50,000 to the Home for the Aged; \$25,000 to St. Luke's Hospital; and \$10,000 each to Roosevelt and New York Hospitals.

### WIFE, HOSPITAL CASE, ASKS FOR ALIMONY FEES

Suing Husband For Separation; He Is Absent to Enter Hospital For Disabled Veterans

Charles F. Dalton, attorney for Edith G. Price, former resident of Pelham Manor, yesterday made a motion for alimony and counsel fees for his client before Supreme Court Justice George H. Taylor, Jr.

It was learned that the counsel fees had been set at \$50, half to be paid at the time of the trial and the other half within a week's time. Mrs. Price is instituting a separation action against her husband on the ground of desertion, while he asks that his marriage be annulled on the ground of fraud. He alleges that he did not know that she had been in inmate of an institution, but the care of the mentally deranged prior to the time he had married her.

Mrs. Price is now confined in the same institution. She alleges that he had no money of her condition. In making the motion for alimony Dalton said that the defendant was making but \$21 weekly he understood that Price would have to enter a hospital for disabled war veterans.

Argue Thursday on Motion in Connection With Boston and Westchester Extension

Argument on a motion for an order to show cause why the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad should not enter into possession of condemned property in the Village of Port Chester was postponed yesterday by Justice George H.
