MOVES TO SET ASIDE \$10,000 JUDGMENT
Attorney Claims Action Accepted Papers in Court Without Knowledge of Contents

A motion to vacate a judgment for \$10,000 brought by default against Harry B. Schultz, 481 West Broadway, Yonkers, in June was argued before Supreme Court Justice Arthur Tompkins here yesterday by former City Judge David Gorfinkle, Schultz's attorney.

The judgment was brought against Schultz for alleged "criminal conversation" with Mrs. Louise Place, the wife of John Howe, a Bronx sculptor, said to have taken place in her apartment on December 10 of last year.

Gorfinkle claimed that his client, an engineer in the Otis Elevator works in Yonkers, did not realize the significance of the papers served on him, showed them in his pocket and allowed the default to be taken against him before Supreme Court Justice Joseph Marchant in June.
