## Rabbi Goodman Must Lead All Local Jewry, Not a Few Families, Dr. Wise Declares at Services

Founder of Free Synagogue, Presiding at Installation Ceremonies, Makes Play for Toleration, Rev. Mr. Osgood Welcomes Young Leader to City. Impressive Function at Center.

"If Abram Goodman is to be rabbi only to a few social circles, he will be no rabbi at all," declared Rev. Dr. Wise at the installation ceremonies of Rabbi Goodman at the Free Synagogue last night. "If he is to be rabbi to all the Jews of White Plains, he must lead them all."

Dr. Wise drew a glowing picture of the possibilities for service before the young man taking over the reins of leadership of the Community Center. He warned the congregation, however, to remember that Rabbi Goodman works best as the preacher of this Center exclusively, but as a rabbi in general, a religious leader for orthodox and reformed Jews alike. He emphasized the responsibility of the congregation itself in the work to be done, reminding them that other faiths cannot be religious for the entire group, that cannot be the conscience of the entire community, nor can it expect all to agree at all times with the opinions and decisions of the congregation.

Mr. Kenneth R. Boynton, head gardener at the Bronx Botanical Gardens, gave an illustrated lecture yesterday afternoon before the members of the garden section of the Contemporary Club, at the home of Mrs. Elmer V. Ortag, 14 Ridgeview avenue.

The plants of Japanese dogwood, cornus japonica, was advised as it blooms two weeks later than the native variety, and is very decorative and hardy. The Amur ampelopsis vine is most profusely covered with various shades of purple, blue and lavender-tinted fruits not duplicated in other decorative shrubs.

The main pom chrysanthemums are useful for massing and "Capitulum" type flowers are generally not duplicated in other decorative shrubs.

American Baritone Will Appear in White Plains Under Auspices of Choral and Symphonic Body

With the recital by Paul Parks, the eminent American baritone of New York City, the White Plains Choral and Symphonic Body will inaugurate its season for the fall and winter at 8 o'clock, Tuesday, October 15th, in the ballroom of the White Plains-Belmont Hotel.

His past concerts here were cordially appreciated and he will be greeted by a large enthusiastic audience. This well-known baritone is a native of Ohio, who came to New York after completing an academic college course to further his ambitions in piano and voice. Upon completing his first tour of the United States, Mr. Parks enlisted in the United States Army in which he served throughout the World War. A wound received in the Battle of the Argonne resulted in the amputation of the left arm and compelled the artist to divert all of his energies to vocal work.

In this field he had been so successful that in 1921 he was awarded the first prize of the Davy Bigham contest for baritone held in Carnegie Hall, New York. Since that time he has filled numerous successful engagements with leading organizations in various cities of the country.
