SCARSDALE'S WATER BOND SALE DEC. 24

Board of Trustees Announce \$87,000 Water Bonds Will Be Sold in N. Y. City

The sale of water improvement bonds to the total of \$87,000 by the village of Scarsdale will be held in the offices of Mayor Robert E. Christie, Jr., at Dillon, Read Company, New York City, at 10 o'clock Tuesday, December 24. It was announced at the meeting of the board of trustees last night.

At this meeting, Trustee George H. Clifton was appointed as a trustee of the Christmas celebration to work in conjunction with the committee from the Town, Club of Scarsdale.

Inasmuch as it was accepted as a village street last night, when the deed of dedication was received by the village board, the street is now open to traffic. In accepting this road, the trustees deemed it advisable to deviate from their usual requirements that the street must be 27 feet wide and curb.

This road is only 37 feet wide and no curb is in at the present time, but it was thought that because the road had been built to specifications and was still in good condition that the policy might be waived in this instance. It was felt that at some later date when the sewers are installed, the property owners will install the curb at their expense.

2,500 TICKETS ISSUED FOR XMAS PARTY

Annual Reception and Entertainment Staged by Santa Claus Promises to Be Well Attended

Holiday activities for the kiddies of the city received a further impetus today when the Chamber of Commerce turned over to the board of education 2,500 tickets for the annual Santa Claus reception and entertainment at Loew's State Theatre on Monday, December 23, at 10 a. m., and erected a Santa Claus post office on the court house steps.

The tickets for the theater party will be distributed to the first five grades of the public schools of the city, and each child ten years old or younger may have one. Parochial as well as city schools will receive the tickets.

By bringing a toy of some sort to the theater with his or her ticket, the child will be admitted to the performance. No adults will be allowed at the theater, and the party being chaperoned by girls from the various Girl Scout troops of the city. The following message printed on each ticket:

"My dear good child:
"Santa Claus wants you to come to his party and bring a nice new book or gift that he can take to the children of poor families. Please help him to remember the little children in the institutions and you will have a Merry Christmas."
"White Plains Chamber of Commerce."
"Santa to Appear"

The seven institutions of the city to which these books, along with others which are being contributed by individuals, will be distributed by the Chamber of Commerce are: Santa Claus on Christmas eve at St. Agnes Hospital, the Orthopedic Hospital, the Campbell Cottage, Grasslands Hospital, the Ripley Home, the Jennie Clarkson Home, the Home of Mercy and the Brace Memorial Farm for Boys.

Santa Claus will appear in person at the party to meet the children and distribute toys, books, fruit and candy. Entertainment will be provided by vaudeville acts and a moving picture.

Each of the morning only a show ready been erected on the Court house steps, where the Santa Claus post office will be located.

The house is a white clapboard cottage, about 8 feet square, and equally as tall, with a sloping green roof and tall chimney, which certainly would make a fine play house for some children. Maybe that's what Santa Claus had in mind when he had it put there.

The Chamber of Commerce assured The Daily Press that it will make certain that the letters which the kiddies drop in the post office will be forwarded to Santa Claus. The youngsters are required to make sure that their names and addresses are in the letters, so that Santa Claus may know from whom they come.

VOTE \$35,000 INCINERATOR IN SCARSDALE

Village Board Will Construct Plant for Destruction of Refuse Only; Boniface Gives Estimates

Scarsdale's board of trustees took a definite step towards the solution of the incineration problem in that village last night, when Village Engineer Arthur Boniface was authorized to prepare plans and specifications for a refuse burner at a cost not to exceed \$35,000. The new plant will be constructed on Secor road a short distance from the town of Scarsdale, and will be maintained by the village for the disposal of garbage.

This step follows a tour of inspection of the incineration plant at Rockville Center, L. I. by several members of the board on Monday.

The new plant will have a capacity of from fifteen to thirty tons, a forty-foot stack, will burn only refuse, no garbage, and is guaranteed not to produce obnoxious odors.

At the present time, the village of Scarsdale is working under an agreement with the town of Eastchester whereby garbage and refuse is burned in the plant of that town.

The new plant will work in conjunction with the present incinerator which utilizes the Becraft system with improvements worked out by Mr. Boniface and destroyed garbage by the fermentation process. The plant was originally constructed in 1923 at a cost of \$13,000, but operation was stopped some time ago by a law suit to prevent what was termed the formation of obnoxious odor. An additional expenditure will be granted to rejuvenate this plant.

According to Mr. Boniface, the amount paid by Scarsdale to Eastchester in three years will pay for the entire cost of the new plant, the expense of which is divided into units of \$90,000 for the plant itself and the remaining \$60,000 for grading, the construction of ramps and other details.

GINSBERG'S ACTION FOR SLANDER

Public Safety Deputy Asks \$50,000 Damages From Alderman H. D. Whittle in Mount Vernon

Rumors which have floated about the city of Mount Vernon for several months involving by implication Mayor James P. Hagg, former supervisor and minister of the Lutheran Church, and Deputy Commissioner of Public Safety Morris Ginsberg, came to a head here today when Ginsberg filed with the county clerk a \$50,000 action for slander against Alderman Harry D. Whittle, who he alleges, referred to him as a "bawling" bootlegger convicted of bringing back into the United States a load of liquor last summer.

The name of Mayor Hagg is brought into the action by Ginsberg in his complaint, filed here today by Patrick J. Rooney, attorney and because of the political strife which has flourished in Mount Vernon for the past year, many of the leading Republican organization members being critical of Hagg's appointments and policies, the action is expected to create county wide interest.

No answer has yet been filed by Whittle but a public statement is expected to be issued by the Mount Vernon councillor.

HENSCHEL IS FREED; CASE WITHDRAWN

Joseph Wade, Proprietor of Roadhouse, Drops Shooting Charge Against Local Man
