The downfall of the New York Yankees world baseball championship in 1927 and 1928 was one single outstanding feature of the 1929 baseball season.

After dominating the American League for three straight seasons and winning the World series of 1927 and 1928 each in four straight games, the Yankees toppled before the Philadelphia Athletics in the American League title-fighting second place, eighteen games behind the new champions.

After winning the American League pennant the Athletics went on to capture the fourth straight world championship for the American League by defeating the Chicago Cubs in four of five games.

The club won the National League pennant by knocking the St. Louis Cardinals out of the lead in the Pittsburgh series.

The World Series was a contest of the world series, there was actually a tie in the post-season series which is agreed as if the National League champions might have won would serve largely for the senior circuit.

The Athletics won the first two games in Chicago thanks to Howie and Ebbetts' dramatic victory in the first game and some hard hitting in the second. The Cubs came back to win the third game in Chicago, behind Guy Bush's great pitching, the first National League victory since 1926, and were leading 3 to 0 when the Athletics came in to win the seventh inning of the fourth game.

Behind the great pitching of Howie and Ebbetts secured two runs and won the game 10 to 8. Ten records were broken or equalled in this contesting game.

Half-raising Bush took the final out of the very group of the Cubs when API Mauer collapsed after banking the A's for a 4-0 home run with one man on tied the score and Big Miller hit drove home the winning run.

The Indians and the Phillies showed the most improvement over 1928 form of the major league club. The Phillies jumped from last place in 1928 to fifth place.

Both pennant races were virtual tie-ups decided several weeks before the end of the season, and there was a general falling off in interest in both races toward the close which was probably unnecessary into the football season in October.

Home run hitting revived the Cubs during the 1929 season. There were 725 homers in the National League, an increase of 145 over the previous year, and 391 in the American League.

Babe Ruth, who was one of the game part of the season with its purse which at one time started higher 1928 he was through for injury, hit forty-six homers, only less than his forty-one in 1928.

Chuck Klein, a newcomer with the Phillies, led the National League in homers with 48.
