Griffiths was eliminated last year ago through a one-round knockout by James J. Braddock, medicine New Jersey light heavyweight and that Risko has been "eliminated," the bout is expected to draw a near capacity house.

Risko was the outstanding success of the "elimination tourney" staged by the late Tex Rickard two years ago but later met numerous defeats, including a knockout at the hands of Max Schmeling, and now is regarded as a "trial horse" for younger fighters.
