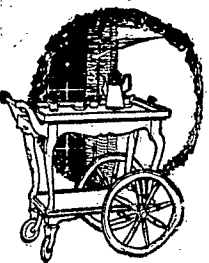

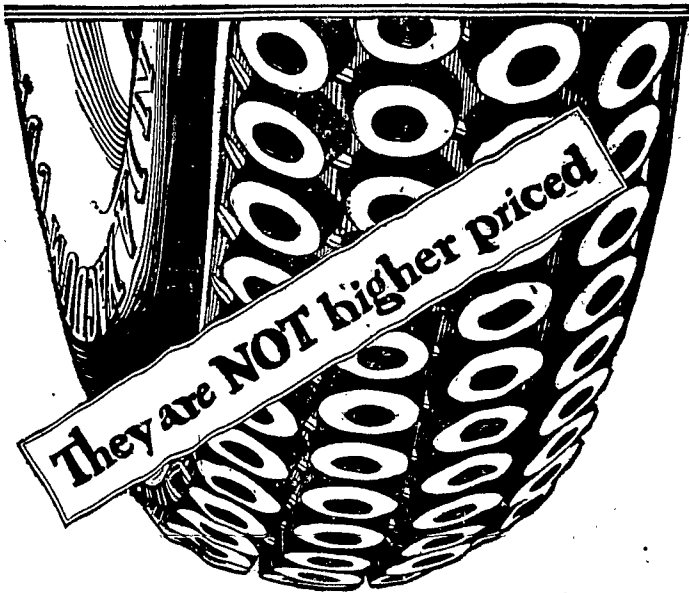

JUSTICE MADE REPORT TO LE ROY ALDERMEN

FIGURES INDICATE THAT MOTORISTS ARE DRIVING MORE MODERATELY.

UNIFORM CURBING ON STREETS

Le Roy, Sept. 12.—Police Justice Macpherson's report for June, July and August, submitted at a session of the aldermen last evening, demonstrated the fact that motorists are driving more moderately in Le Roy. The police justice handed forty cases of a criminal nature during the past quarter, divided as follows: Traffic violations, 20; reckless driving, 11; public intoxication, 8; larceny, 1.

Fines collected and bail forfeited totaled \$307, of which \$98 was paid to the state treasurer pursuant to article 11 of the highway law.

The idea of a uniform curbing on all streets of the village was discussed, and it was the unanimous opinion of the aldermen that such a system of curbing would materially improve the appearance of the village. Mayor Ward agreed to secure information as to the probable cost of curbing from a contractor equipped to handle work of this character on a large scale. It is possible that a plan may be worked out whereby the cost of the improvement will be borne in some proportion by the village and property owners.

An unused balance of \$51.24 remaining in the appropriation for band concerts after paying for the concerts of the past season was ordered turned over to the Le Roy band. The fire companies' appropriation for each year is \$100. Smith & Given were granted permission to erect an electric sign in front of their Main street store. The following building permits were granted: William Conlon, Wolcott street, garage; Frank Amzelone, Mill street, garage.

Mayor Ward and Clerk Chapman reported a conference with Superintendent Stein of the Western New York Utilities Company, who advises holding up installation of the new fire alarm system for the present in view of the fact that the electric company, in co-operation with the Rochester Telephone Corporation, intend to rebuild the entire pole and wiring system in the village within the coming year. Mr. Stein stated that if the fire alarm system were installed now, over half the system would have to be reconstructed when the rebuilding is taken up by the electric and telephone companies.

The matter has been taken up with the Underwriters' Association, and if it will consent to the delay in the installation of the proposed fire alarm system, it is probable that the work will be done until next year. Under the plans mapped out by the electric and telephone companies many poles on the village streets will be eliminated, new wiring of proper size will be strung, and electric, telephone and fire alarm wires will be uniformly placed on all poles in the order named from the top down, as required by modern regulations.

Moseley-Pangrazio

Le Roy, Sept. 12.—St. Anthony's Catholic church at Lime Rock, four miles east of this village, was the scene of a pretty wedding at 9:30 o'clock this morning when Miss Louise Pangrazio, daughter of Mrs. and Mr. Modest Pangrazio, was united in marriage to Charles M. Moseley of Retsof. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Edward Bayer, pastor of St. Lucy's church at Retsof, in the presence of a large assembly of relatives and friends.

The bride was attired in a gown of white satin crepe and carried a bouquet of orange blossoms. She carried a nosegay of bride roses. Both wore wreaths of pink leaves and carried bouquets of pink roses.

Little Misses Eleanor Lee and Germaine Uhly, niece and cousin of the bride respectively, were the flower girls, being attired in dresses of white cotton crepe and carrying baskets of asters and cosmos. The groom was attended by Michael Rogers of Le Roy and Alvin Pringle of Retsof. Joseph Pangrazio of Caledonia and Charles Milidam of Rochester, brother and brother-in-law of the bride, acted as ushers. The bride was given in marriage by her father.

Following the wedding dinner was served at the home of the bride's parents on the Lows road, about sixty being present. Covers were laid for 12 at the bride's table. Gladioli were used in the house decorations. During the afternoon Mr. and Mrs. Moseley left upon a western trip by motor and upon their return will make their home in Retsof. Pre-nuptial events were variety shows given by the bride's cousin, Mrs. George Uhly of Black street, and Mrs. Charles Lee, a sister of the bride, in Rochester.

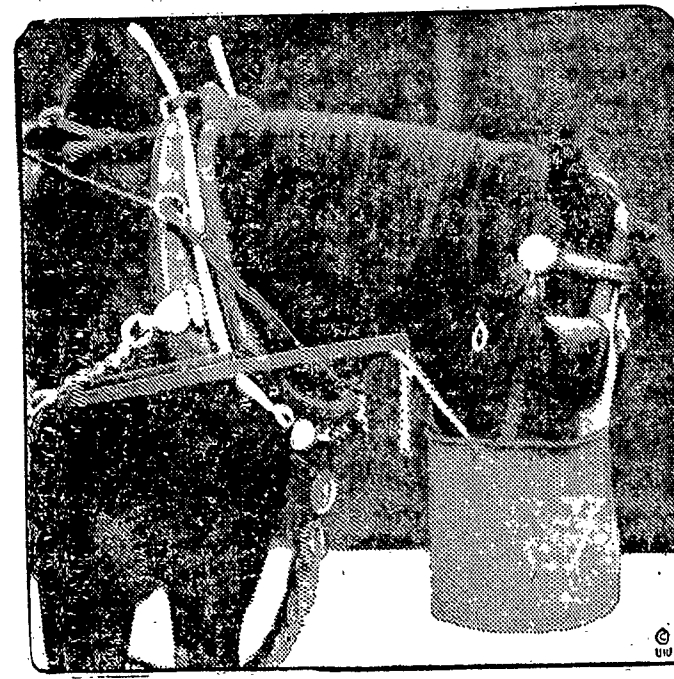

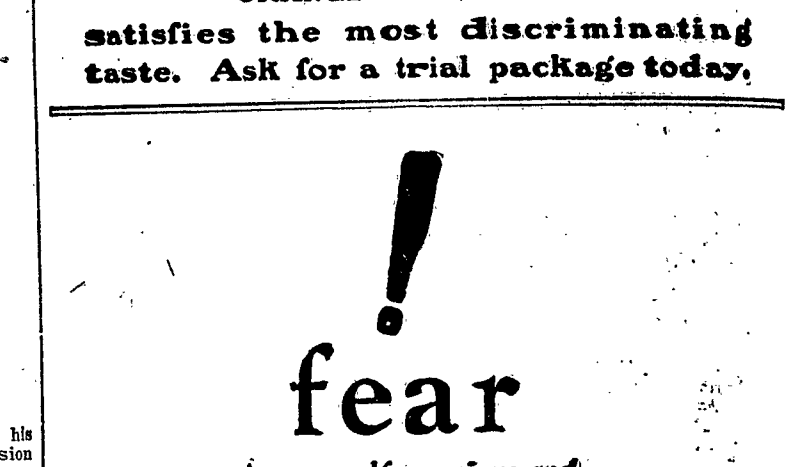

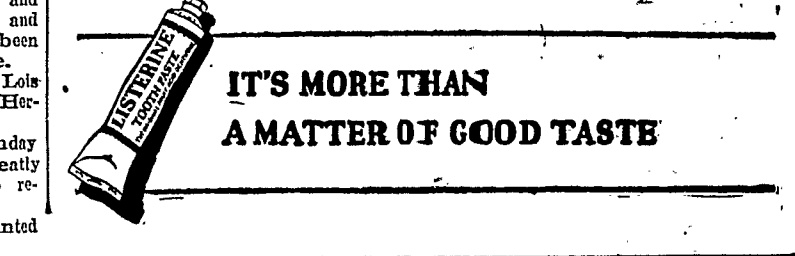
