

FOUND DEAD IN SHOE SHOP

Body of Peter Kalmus Under Gas Jets.

LIFE EXHIBIT FOR SEVERAL HOURS

Well Known Shoemaker in Lockwood Building—Leak of Gas Traced to His Rooms—Coroner Harding Investigates.

Peter Kalmus, a well-known shoemaker, about 65 years of age, was found dead at 11.30 o'clock Wednesday night, April 12, in the rear of his shoe shop in the Lockwood building on upper Pike street with two jets of gas over his head turned on at full height. The discovery was made by Policeman W. B. Hornbeck, who had received a telephone message from Manager D. R. Thomas, of the Port Jervis Gas Company, that a leak of gas was reported in the Lockwood building but that an investigation had failed to locate the leak. The gas was then shut off in the building. The body of Kalmus was discovered lying on two chairs in the back room.

Coroner Edgar J. Harding and Dr. C. M. Knapp were called, and after investigation, came to the conclusion that Kalmus had been dead for several hours. The body was removed to the undertaking rooms of Fred H. Porter, at 165 Pike street.

Kalmus had been engaged in the shoemaking business and for many years conducted a shop on Jersey avenue near the present O. & V. freight depot. At one time he was a regular police officer of the village of Port Jervis. But little is known of his early history although it is stated that he has relatives living in Honesdale, Pa.

OF INTEREST TO FORESTERS.
A Decision Restraining the Increase of Rates of Insurance.

Rochester, April 13.—A decision of widespread interest was handed down by Supreme Court Justice George A. Benton late yesterday in an action brought by Henry J. Simmelink against the Independent Order of Foresters for a permanent injunction restraining the order from raising the rates of insurance.

Simmelink joined the order in 1890, and in 1908 the corporation raised his monthly assessment from 78 cents to \$1.35. Justice Benton held that the defendant had no right to raise the rate, and issued a permanent injunction.

Mice Feast on Currency.

Wyatt Jones, janitor of the Dutchess County Court House, at Poughkeepsie, tucked a \$100 bill in the toe of a shoe for safe keeping several weeks ago. Last Thursday Jones went to get the bill and found only two corners, the rest of the bill having been eaten by mice. He forwarded the scraps of the old bill to the treasury department at Washington with the hope of having the bill replaced.

FIRE IN HONESDALE.

Livery Stable Destroyed on Wednesday Night—Property Threatened.

About 9 o'clock last Wednesday night the livery stable of Courtright & Son, situated on West Main street, in Honesdale, was destroyed by fire and one of the horses was badly burned so that it is doubtful that it will recover. There were 15 horses in the barn and with one exception all were taken out safely. Residences in the neighborhood were threatened among the number being that of Eric Conductor Charles Lord. The barn owned by Dr. P. B. Peterson and a building owned by the Wayne Milling Company were destroyed.

While it was impossible owing to the intense heat and the volume of the fire to save the Courtright property the firemen did good work in protecting the adjacent residences and buildings on West Main street.

LITTLE BOY LOSES LIFE.

Trying to Save His Toy Doggie in Quassack Creek.

Frank Thorpe, 2½ years of age, was drowned in Quassack Creek, on Thursday. The little fellow had been playing with his toy dog, when it dropped in a stream that ran near the house. He went in the house for his mother to recover it for him. She told him to wait. When she looked again the child was gone, and the grandfather, fearing something had happened to him, followed the stream for a quarter of a mile and found the body held fast near the shore by some rocks in which the clothing had caught.

YEARS UP \$600.

Stranger Spends Money Lavishly and Detroys Remnants.

New York, April 13.—Gloom pervades Mills Hotel No. 3, at Seventh avenue and Thirty-sixth street, today because the man who tore up the money when he couldn't find anything else to spend it for, had not returned. The reckless plutocrat is a mystery, but he is described as a youth who apparently was not used to spending his time in a hotel of that kind.

After being at the place a week he appeared in the lounging room with a registered letter. A man to whom he showed it said it bore a Long Island postmark and contained three \$1,000 bills.

The youth then disappeared in the direction of Broadway, and when he returned at 6 o'clock in the evening he looked like a man who had spent considerable money, but none of it in a dry goods store. He had dinner and gave Lulu Wilson, the waitress, a \$15 tip.

He then disappeared, but the next morning in a corner of the wash room was found a pile of what had once been real paper money—remnants of \$600 worth. There was not more than one piece of each bill, and all denominations from \$1 to \$50 were represented. The other ends and the middle parts were missing.

There were 420 men registered at the hotel at the time the confettied currency was found, and in a few minutes fully 420 men became enthusiastically interested in the hot-bathing facilities. But no more pieces were found.

INQUISITION AT MATTEAWAN

Harry Thaw Refused to be Examined by Experts.

WHO HAVE SAID HE IS A PARANOIC

One Hundred and Forty Patients Examined — Lees Secures Habeas Corpus Writ Returnable in Newburgh Saturday.

Harry K. Thaw will not be examined by Drs. Carlos F. MacDonald and Austin Flint in the inquiry they have begun for Gov. Dix into the condition of the inmates of the State Hospital for the Criminal Insane if the advice of Charles Morechauser, his counsel, is followed. Thursday Thaw declined to be examined. His mother visited him during the day. She said her son based his refusal on the ground that Drs. MacDonald and Flint already have expressed their opinion that he is a paranoic.

One hundred and forty patients have been examined so far. "We are getting along rapidly," Dr. MacDonald said, "because of our knowledge of many of the cases that come before us. Some of them have been under our personal charge. We know the records and ailments of others. In still others insanity is easily discerned, but with others we must work for hours."

"The most baffling of all forms is paranoia. When such a man and a clever lawyer get before a jury the most favorable impression may be conveyed and yet the man may be the victim of many delusions. We are meeting such cases in this inquiry."

Norman A. Lees, through whose efforts six persons have been released from the Matteawan Asylum for the Criminal Insane, got another habeas corpus writ Thursday from Justice Kelly in Brooklyn for Louis Stringin, alias Harry Goldberg, arrested in Manhattan in 1908 while selling shoe strings on the street. The charge against him was being a public nuisance. He was sent to Blackwell's Island and later transferred to Matteawan.

Stringin will be produced before Justice Tompkins in special term of the Supreme Court at Newburgh on Saturday. The writ was served on the authorities at Matteawan by Lees.

UNWRITTEN LAW FAILS.

Rich Texan Must Serve Five Months For Murder.

Dallas, Texas, April 12.—The "unwritten law" got a setback in the highest court of Texas when Don Gray, of Burnett, one of the wealthiest men in the state, appeared in court at Burnett, after his case was affirmed, surrendered and was ordered taken to the penitentiary to serve five years for killing William Phillips.

He claimed Phillips had wronged a woman relative.

Guests of Hose Six.

At a special meeting of Wallkill Hose Company Monday night an invitation from Tri-State Hose Company to participate in the firemen's parade at Port Jervis on August 17th, was accepted. The company will undoubtedly appear in new suits which are soon to be purchased from the proceeds of the firemen's fair held in December, 1909.—Sussex Independent.

OLDEST WOMAN IN N. Y. DEAD

Mrs. Esther Davis, Born 117 Years Ago in Yagostov, Russia.

Mrs. Esther Davis, born 117 years ago in Yagostov, Russia, and the oldest woman in New York, is dead. Until the end she was in full possession of her faculties.

Until 1906 Old Esther, as she had been known to more than three generations on the east side, peddled candles. Her customers were orthodox Jews, who used the candles in their symbolical sacrifices. In that year a horse knocked her down. For weeks it was feared the old woman would die, but health and strength came back to her, and on her one hundred and twelfth birthday she danced and defied any about her to dance as she could.

Mrs. Davis came to this country more than thirty-five years ago. Her physique had much to do with her preservation. Until she was a century old she weighed 180 pounds. Recently when she was asked how she accounted for her long life she replied:

"I have faith in God."

Mrs. Davis in February, 1910, saw an old man helped into a charitable home and recognized him as her son-in-law, Max Shapiro, aged eighty-five. Shapiro said he was too tired and feeble to work. Mrs. Davis laughed at him and told him he was a mere child.

70,000 Autos Licensed in N. Y. State.

It is estimated that there will be 75,000 autos licensed by New York State for 1911 when all registrations are in, and these will be about 39,000 chauffeurs in possession of badges. The cars will thus be about 12,000 more than last year, and the professional drivers will be 3,000 more than in 1910. It is estimated that the revenue to the state will be about \$800,000.

DEATH OF OCTAGENARIAN.

Well Known Resident of Milford Joins Great Majority.

Mrs. Rosalie Perrochet Fauchere, widow of Louis Fauchere, died at her home, the Hotel Fauchere, in Milford at 6 o'clock on Wednesday evening, at the advanced age of 83 years. She was a native of Switzerland.

Since March 1, 1867, over 44 years, Mrs. Fauchere has been a resident of Milford where, with her husband, who was formerly a chef for Delmonico, the noted restaurant proprietor of New York City, they conducted the Hotel Fauchere, one of the noted hotels of eastern Pennsylvania. She was married to Mr. Fauchere on November 16, 1846. The death of Mr. Fauchere occurred on September 11, 1893.

The surviving relatives are one daughter, Mrs. Tissot, of Milford; one grandson, Warren F. Chol, of Milford, and one granddaughter, Louise, wife of Percy Lyman, of Scranton.


