## OBITUARY.

### Scott Mills.

Postmaster Scott Mills, of Warwick, who died suddenly at his home in that village, Thursday night, after he had performed his duties at postmaster during the day apparently in good health had been postmaster of the village for the last 12 years.

Scott Mills was born at Paterson, N. J., June 26, 1840. His parents were John and Sarah Briarly Mills, and both were of English extraction. He acquired his education in the public school at Paterson. He was identified with the Rogers Locomotive Works for a period of four years. He enlisted in Mar., 1861, in Company A, Second Regiment, N. J. Volunteers and was honorably discharged. He participated in all the important engagements in which his regiment was engaged, and became first lieutenant. After the close of the war he moved to Port Jervis, and was connected with the Erie Railroad as foreman in the shops in this city for a period of 14 years. He went west for three years, after which he removed to Warwick and filled the position of master mechanic of the Lehigh & Hudson Railroad for 16 years. In 1898 he was appointed postmaster at Warwick, which position he held until his death.

He was united in marriage with Melvina Jackson, of Amity, Orange county, N. Y., May 17, 1865. To this union five children were born: Sarah, Anna, Isabel, John and Charles. In politics Mr. Mills was a Republican. He was a member of Lincoln Post, G. A. R., of Newark, N. J., and attended the Episcopal Church at Warwick.

### Mrs. Margaret Houck Miller.

Mrs. Margaret Houck Miller, wife of Frank Miller, died at her home in Hawley, Pa., on Monday night, after a long illness, of a complication of diseases. She was aged 66 years. ## MEETING OF MEDICAL SOCIETY

Orange County Practitioners Met at Library Hall on Tuesday Afternoon.

### "TYPHOID FLY" IS DISCUSSED

Interesting Business and Scientific Session—Papers Read on "Pulmonary Tuberculosis" by Otisville Sanitarium Physicians.

At the conclusion of the dinner in the Hotel Mitchell early on Tuesday afternoon, the business and scientific session of the Orange County Medical Society was held in the Library Hall. There was a large attendance of members and there were several visitors present from the staff of the Otisville Sanitarium. In the absence of the President, Dr. H. L. Winters, of Cornwall, Vice-President Dr. R. F. Medrick, of Port Jervis, presided. Dr. E. C. Thompson, of Newburgh, acted as secretary.

After considerable discussion, the resignation of Dr. Thomas L. Gilson, of Middletown, as a member of the society was accepted by a vote of 22 to 3.

It was moved and carried that a representative of the State Department of Health at Albany be invited to attend the next quarterly meeting of the society and that a public mass meeting be held.

A resolution was offered to the effect that any member of the society who consults with an osteopath or recommends consultation with an osteopath violates the ethics of the profession. The resolution was referred to a committee of three to be appointed by the President to report at the next quarterly meeting.

It was voted to ask the Board of Supervisors to allow a fee of \$10 for each examination for the commitment of an insane person to an institution.

The society authorized the appointment of six delegates to attend, in Yonkers, N. Y., on Thursday, October 12th, the meeting of the First District Branch of the New York State Medical Society comprising the counties of New York, Orange, Rockland and Dutchess.

The scientific session was devoted to an illustrated talk by Dr. G. W. Shirik, of Cornwall, on "The Typhoid Fly," in which he gave a most interesting analysis of the anatomy and life of the common house fly (mustela domestica) which is a common carrier of the bacillus of diphtheria, tuberculosis, dysentery, cholera, summer complaints and various other diseases. He stated that the fly increased in arithmetical progression and from the eggs of one female hatched in April and till cool weather was reached in September it was estimated that 5,760,000,000,000 flies had come into existence!

Dr. Shirik stated, that, in a recent trip to the Canal Zone, he observed that the city of Panama was free from flies and mosquitoes, thanks to the efficiency of the health department of the United States Government, under the direction of Chief Engineer G. W. Goethals and Colonel W. C. Gorgas, Chief Sanitary Officer, who are doing splendid work.

Photographer W. H. Allerton operated the blottion which showed a fine series of scientific views.

For the second part of the scientific session was a discussion of "The Diagnosis of Pulmonary Tuberculosis" in papers submitted by members of the Otisville Sanitarium; Dr. W. L. Rathburn (Clinical); Dr. W. H. White (Laboratory); Dr. Louis Shalet (Biologic). This feature was greatly appreciated by the physicians.

The meeting then adjourned.

## ADMIRAL SCHLEY DROPS DEAD.

Hero of Spanish-American War Expired Suddenly in New York.

New York, Oct. 2.—Admiral Winfield Scott Schley dropped dead near the corner of 44th street and Fifth avenue, while walking down town today. He died before medical aid could arrive.

Admiral Schley had been out of town over Sunday. On his return he went to the New York Yacht Club in West 44th street. After a short stay at the Club, Schley left and started along 44th street, when was suddenly taken ill.

Rear Admiral Schley was 72 years of age and was a native of Frederick, Maryland. He was graduated in 1869 from the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, and served in the U. S. Navy until 1901, when he was retired, having reached the age limit. He was promoted to Rear Admiral in 1898 during the Spanish-American War, when he was in command of the white squadron that wiped out the fleet of Admiral Cervera near Santiago, Cuba.
