## HOW MUCH DAMAGE WILL BRIDGE DO?

Question That Agitates the County and Frank Pierson, of Otisville.

### COMMISSION DECIDES \$3,000

County of Orange Thinks This a Rather Steep Estimate on Three-Fourths of an Acre, Damages Included.

Newburgh, July 24.—When the county of Orange directed that a bridge 22 feet in height should be erected over the Erie tracks near Otisville, in front of the residence of Frank Pierson, it laid the foundation for litigation that promises to be quite expensive. To start with, the county and Mr. Pierson could not agree as to the amount of damages done and the value of three-quarters of an acre of land taken in order to provide approaches. The matter was taken to the Supreme Court and Justice Morschauer appointed a commission, consisting of James G. Myers, of Matteawan; Charles T. Dunning, of Goshen, and George R. Vail, of Chester, to hear testimony and make the award.

The commission took testimony, at which it was shown that the bridge was offensive to the owner of the lands, that it caused him continued expense in conducting his business, cut off his view from the house and has necessitated the construction of new approaches to the residence in order that he may get to and from his home. The testimony of experts placed the damages at from \$3,700 to \$5,000. The commission on Saturday laid, at special term, Poughkeepsie, reported to Justice Morschauer in favor of granting Mr. Pierson \$3,000, which the commission looked upon as a low figure. The county of Orange thinks the amount is excessive, and contests the award. Former Senator John C. R. Taylor, of Middletown, appeared for Mr. Pierson and requested that the award be approved, while Percy V. D. Gott, representing the county, protested against its approval. Justice Morschauer says he will investigate the matter and announce his views later.
