From the National Intelligencer. The Military Peace Establishment.—It is understood that the arrangement of the Officers according to the new and reduced organization of the Peace Establishment, was completed at the close of the last week...

The Nottingham Calendar contains the number of thirty-two men and boys who have been sentenced to death at the late assizes.

At the Staffordshire Assizes, twenty-eight persons received sentence of death, one aged 16, two 17, and two 18 years of age.

At the Kent Assizes forty-one persons were condemned to death, the greater part of whom were for house breaking.

At the Devonshire Assizes, eleven men and one woman were sentenced to death. The latter was for entering a dairy, and stealing bread, butter, &c.

Four men were executed at the Old Bailey, on the 27th of March; one for highway robbery, and three for stealing in dwelling houses.
