DEBUT OF A CHATEAUGAY LADY

At the New National Theatre, Washington, D. C., June 11.

The following are the comments of the Washington press, also a letter from the author of the play, upon the debut of Miss Maud Beckwith:

The National Theater was well filled last evening by an audience of representative people, who were curious to see how the story of the "Discovery of America" would be told in dramatic form. The character of the play produced many agreeable surprises, for it was of the highest literary order, was full of dramatic situations, was intensely interesting, was bright, racy and charming. It pleased the pit because of its excellence, it pleased the gallery because of its exciting interest.

The company was first-class, as was their acting also. If enthusiasm in an audience is any indication of merit the performance must rank as one of the best that was ever given in this city. Edmund Shaftsbury is a man of about thirty-five years, of magnificent presence, with one of the best voices we ever listened to. He believes in living the character of Columbus instead of acting it, and makes his audience think they are present in the scene of four hundred years ago instead of in the theater in the nineteenth century. A large class of people who do not usually attend the theater and some who never before witnessed a play, were present last evening, owing to the universal interest which attaches to anything connected with Columbus at the present day. This drama is a grand lesson in history. The costumes were all new and the makeup of the characters was perfect. It was old Spain in her most glorious period. The people who were unable to get inside the theater lost an evening's entertainment that combined both pleasure and profit.

Miss Maud Beckwith played the part of Beatrice, and, although it was a difficult role, she was equal to the task. Her voice is deep and full, and she was enabled to display its expressive power in her conversation with the clouds.—Washington Star.

Beatrice is of the noble type of Spanish ladies. Miss Maud Beckwith sustained the character to perfection. She is an actress of great power, both in her voice and action. Her face is wonderfully beautiful.—Washington Critic.
