

Marion Store Closes After 83 Years

Marion's oldest and most prominent business, the Marion Store, operated by the Goossen and Company, a local business that has been a part of the community since the cracker barrel days, will close its doors after supplying local and area residents with groceries and dry goods for the past 83 years.

Since its beginning by James Peter Goossen in 1855, the business has changed hands several times during the years. Approximately five years after it opened,

Peter Goossen became a partner, and a short time later, Peter Goossen became the third partner. At that time the store became Goossen and Company. In 1928, James H. Goossen and Leon Shippers purchased the business and continued its operation under the same name. Mr. Goossen retired in 1950 at which time Mr. Shippers assumed sole ownership of the store and has operated it until the present time.

The building will undergo complete renovation and will be remodeled to serve three new businesses. A restaurant will occupy the south end and will be operated by Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Bushart and Mrs. Edwin Bielek. The south end will be divided into two sections where Dorothy's Beauty Shop and Howard's Barber Shop will be located.

Marion—An interest in doing volunteer work for the benefit of migrants and/or other residents of the community and county has been shown by several Marion residents at local and area meetings the past weeks.

Since county leaders have emphasized a need for a task force-for-action immediately, representatives of the women's group from each church in Marion met Monday night at the home of Mrs. Durfee Young for the purpose of considering possible steps toward action by local volunteers.

This action program is being sponsored by local churches but includes residents of the community whether the individuals are church-affiliated or not. It is hoped that volunteers will be reached as a result of communication through Rotary, firemen, W.M.S., Eastern Star and other organizations as well as individuals who happen to read this communication.

An action-program-for-Marion might include one or more of the following:

—Working at the Williamson Center at least one Wednesday each month.

—Provide transportation for people who need to get to a medical clinic or doctor.

—Furnishing a truck once in a while to transport donated furniture.

—Operate a movie projector during an evening at the Williamson-Center or provide transportation for a young person who is trained to operate a projector.

—Alert Mrs. Albert Short if individuals reside in Marion who wish to learn to read.

—Assist county leaders concerning housing for migrant or other families.

—Other activities as needs develop.

The next meeting of the above mentioned temporary leaders is scheduled for Wednesday, May 1, 9:30 a.m., at the home of Mrs. Durfee Young, Marion residents are urged to contact any of the above mentioned chairmen if interested in volunteering to assist in this activity.

Marion Woman Compiles 'A's' In R.I.T. Course

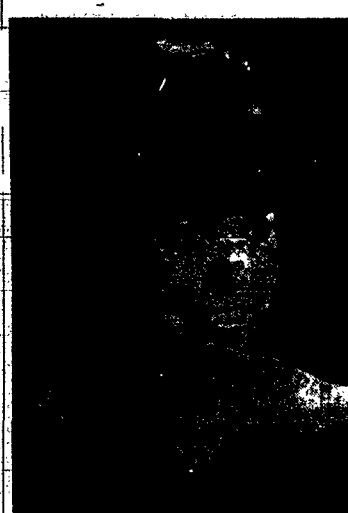

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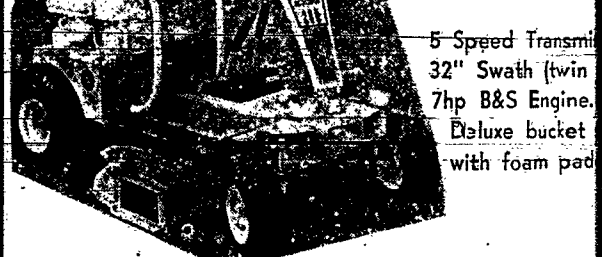
