

Sheriff Probes 370 Complaints in April

Wayne County Sheriff's Department reports a total of 370 complaints received and investigated during the month of April. The 10 patrol cars traveled a total of 46,525 miles in normal work.

The 370 complaints consisted of 39 automobile accidents, 25 complaints of injury to persons, 25 complaints of damage to homes, 21 notifications of emergency escorts and 20 emergency blood tests given to other agencies; three complaints of lost and found items and two of lost and found keys.

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George Roever, commissioner with the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Board in Syracuse, was called in on the labor dispute at the request of Mayor Milton Elzofon, Labor and management met Tuesday at the Old World Inn with Roever reporting "no progress" in the strike which began May 1 over a "wage differential" between the Newark and Rochester plants.

William Fennell, plant manager, said yesterday production has been over 50 per cent of normal and military equipment produced for the U. S. Armed Forces here is being prepared for shipment in accordance with government requirements. He said that since the strike began more than 75 union represented employees have reported back to work and with the assistance of supervisory and other plans have been able to maintain essential production operations.

Clifford Haley, international representative for Local 339 of the International Union of Electrical Workers, appeared before Tuesday night's village board meeting at City Hall to report on the strike.

He said he is in control of the strike called May 1 over a "wage differential." Haley said the local General Dynamics plant is paying a hiring wage of \$1.60 an hour compared with a 29 to 30-cent higher hiring rate in Palmyra and a hiring rate of 69 cents more at a paper plant in Newark.

Haley pointed out that the wage differential is better than 60 cents an hour. Haley said the Newark plant pays a hiring wage of \$1.60 an hour and Rochester \$2.12 an hour.

"We're asking a small contribution that the company will recognize this wage differential," said Haley. "We seek only to bring some form of economic adjustment. This company is making a contribution to keep this area in a depressed state."

Haley said the union is willing to expose its position to the community. Two employees at the Newark plant reported vandalism to their cars parked on Siegrist St. Tuesday.

Joyce King, 35 Pleasant St., Clifton Springs, reported that her white 1963 car was sprayed with black paint. Larry Gillette, 15 Westside Drive, Lyons, reported to police that someone sprayed black paint on his maroon car which was parked near Newton St.

Police arrested three pickets last Friday at 12:48 a.m. on disorderly conduct charges. They were: Ralph Thomas Holby, 46, Stanley RD 2; Eloise Doris Briggs, 40, Lyons RD 3; Minnie D. Sizemore, 19, of 40 Franklin St., Lyons.

They were released on \$25 bail each when arraigned before Village Justice Thomas W. Bidle. The arrests brought to five the number arrested since the strike began May 1.

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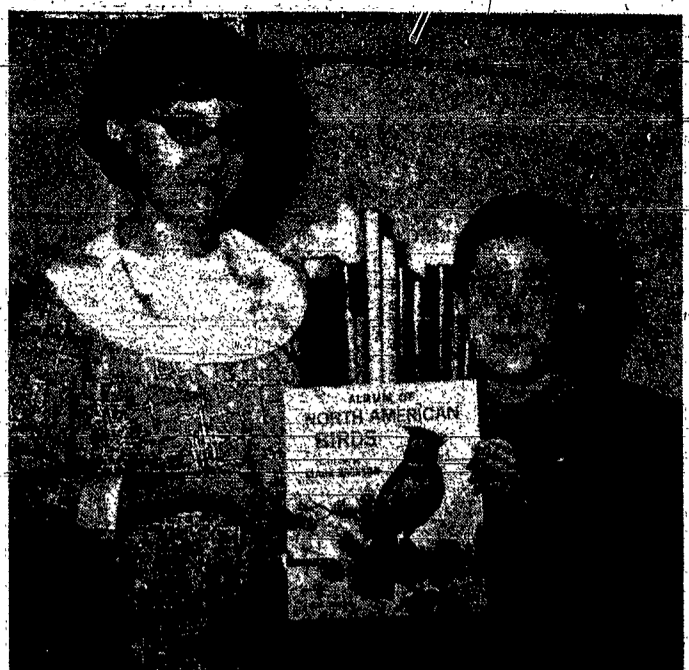
