## Marion Branch Tops Red Cross Quota

Marion—The Marion branch of the Wayne County Chapter of the American Red Cross has exceeded its fund quota, according to fund chairman.

Mrs. Williamson, 1968 Red Cross. A total of \$1,381.79 was raised, while the quota was set at \$1,320. Abram Boerman was chairman of the drive in Marion.

Three other branches have also exceeded their quotas. They are: Butler, quota \$415, raised \$418.47; Huron, \$475 quota, raised \$507.56; and Red Creek, \$495 quota, raised \$580.44.

Mrs. Williamson stressed the need for the Chapter to reach its County goal of \$34,050, especially because serving the men in Vietnam has greatly increased the expenses of the Chapter.

Also, Mrs. Williamson noted that advances in medicine which have brought about greater usage of blood is an added expenditure to the Chapter. It costs the Wayne County Red Cross \$9.27 to collect, process and transport one pint of blood.

Jason has been active in athletics having played on the varsity basketball and soccer teams. He has also been active in the field of music. He is a three year member of the senior chorus, and the senior band.

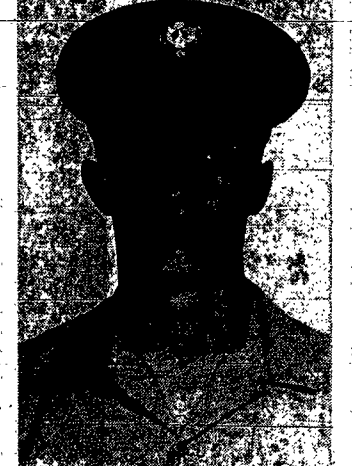

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION  
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the resolution published herewith has been adopted by the Town Board of the Town of Marion, Wayne County, New York, on the 29th day of April, 1968. The said resolution is hereby authorized for an object or purpose for which said town money or the provisions of law which should have been complied with as of the date of adoption of this notice were not substantially complied with, and an action or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of publication of this notice or such objections were authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution. Date of Adoption: New York April 30, 1968.

BOND RESOLUTION DATED APRIL 29, 1968.  
RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$72,000 SERIAL BONDS OF THE TOWN OF MARION, WAYNE COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE PURCHASE OF MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT FOR THE TOWN HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT OF SAID TOWN.

Section 1. The Town Board of the Town of Marion, Wayne County, New York, as follows:

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of the proposed class of objects of the serial bonds herein authorized to be issued is \$72,000. The plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance and sale of \$72,000 serial bonds of said Town of Marion, New York, and the proceeds therefrom to be used for the purchase of machinery and equipment for the Highway Department of said Town.

Section 3. The chief fiscal officer of said Town is hereby authorized to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewal of such notes, as hereby delegated to the Supervisor of said Town, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor in conformity with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewal of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor of said Town, the chief fiscal officer.

Section 5. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the proposed class of objects or purposes is five years, pursuant to subdivision 2 of paragraph 1 of section 110 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. It is hereby further determined that no down payment is required in connection with the proposed class of objects or purposes since the estimated net cost of the serial bonds authorized will not be in excess of five years.

Section 7. The cash and credit of said Town of Marion, New York, are hereby authorized to be used for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same may be made in each appropriate year, the principal and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in each year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable property in said Town, a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 8. The validity of such bonds may be contested only if: 1) Such bonds are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to incur such indebtedness; 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with; and 3) An action or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of the adoption of this resolution.

Section 9. This resolution, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in full in the Newark Courier-Gazette together with a Clerk's certificate in substantial conformity with section 110 of the Local Finance Law.
