

Junior High Student Killed by Tractor

A Newark Junior High School student was killed Saturday afternoon in a tractor accident on his father's farm on the Brantling Hill Road, just south of the Sodas town line.

John Owen Miller III, son of Mr. and Mrs. John O. Miller Jr., 14, was operating a tractor when it overturned and pinned him beneath it, according to State Police.

Trooper B. L. Shocken and Investigator E. W. Coryell of the Newark substation investigated the farm fatality which occurred about 2 p.m. The report that the Miller youth was operating the tractor on a steep grade when the vehicle overturned and pinned him underneath.

Investigators said the victim was found a half hour later by his brother, Terry, 9. Dr. Edward Diamond of Newark pronounced the youth dead at the scene with Dr. C. Dupha Reeves, county coroner, attributing death to asphyxiation due to

Mrs. F. N. Stroup Succumbs at 77-- Former Historian

Mrs. Irma G. Stroup of 242 Prospect St. passed away Sunday (June 23, 1968) in Newark-Wayne Community Hospital. She was 77.

The daughter of Charles and Alice Marshall Gallup, she was born in Adams Basin, N. Y. on Oct. 11, 1890.

She was a resident of Newark for 47 years and served as historian for the Town of Arcadia since 1954. She wrote the book entitled, "Around the Town in Bygone Days," a history of Newark and the Town of Arcadia which had appeared as a series in the Newark Courier-Gazette.

A member of the Colonel William Prescott Chapter of the DAR, in 1963, she received a national citation for the nation's best DAR story, which was printed in seven articles in the Courier-Gazette.

For 47 years she was a member of the Park Presbyterian Church and was an active member of the Women's Association, which in 1957 gave her a life membership on the board of foreign missions.

She attended Syracuse University and was graduated from Mechanics Institute, now RIT.

Her husband was the superintendent of Newark schools for 17 years, serving from 1921-38, when he passed away. Her father was a member of the state assembly in 1912.

She is survived by two daughters, Harold Bush of Marion and Mrs. James Dumary of Perry; and five grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 11 a.m. at the Scott Funeral Home, Inc. with the Rev. Walter R. Hobkirk officiating. Burial was in Garland Cemetery near Brockport.

He had the responsibility for the elementary program at Sodas last year, but during the past year had concentrated his efforts within the new primary school. His main responsibilities at Stoney Point will be in the area of personnel, recruitment, negotiations. He will also have an important role in developing school board policy, teachers' certification, teacher-union relations, building projects and evaluation projects.

Stoney Point is located in the U. S. Military Academy West Point. It is the second largest growing community within New York State with a school population of 6,000 students and a staff of 310 teachers. School budget recently exceeded \$8 million.

Downer previously taught fourth and fifth grade at Perkins elementary school and his wife, Margaret, and four children will be moving to Stoney Point in August.

"We'll be taking many memories of Sodas and Newark and the friends we'll leave behind," he said.
