Teenager Held In Car Theft After Accident

Marion—Town Constable Arthur Bouwens received a report recently that an automobile had been seen partially submerged in a swamp on the Withersden Road.

An investigation by Sheriff's Deputies Paul Fowler and Raymond Harold and Constable Bouwens led to Lyons where a 15-year-old Marion youth was questioned regarding the incident and admitted taking the car illegally. Another teenager, also from Marion, admitted being involved in the theft and was a passenger in the car.

The accident occurred when the driver lost control of the vehicle and failed to make a curve. The car slipped through trees, thick underbrush and over a rocky area before coming to a stop in the swamp. Neither of the occupants sustained injuries.

The 15-year-old boy is being held by juvenile authorities while awaiting charges in connection with the theft.
