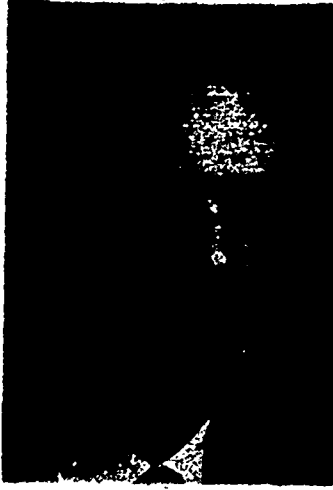

Bloodmobile Visits North Java; 76 Pints Of Blood Collected

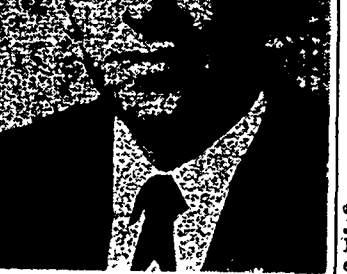
Nov. 5—Red Cross officials were particularly pleased with the results of the Bloodmobile visits to North Java Monday, November 2. A total of 94 donors appeared to donate blood and 76 pints were collected. The balance of 18 were unable to donate for various medical reasons which do not indicate that the individuals were in poor health, but rather that they were not at present quite up to the high standards felt necessary by the medical authorities for the sharing of blood.

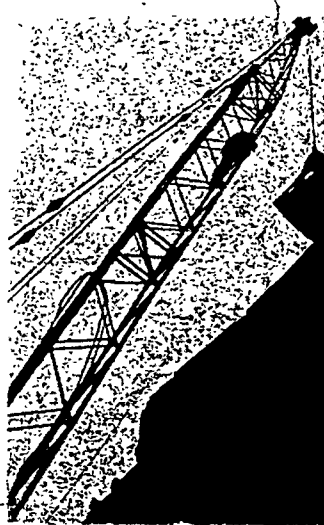
Delevan Couple To Celebrate Golden Wedding Anniversary

North Street Home Razed By Fire; Inside Completely Destroyed



Nov. 19—Pictured above is the Street as it looked to firemen after the Charles Close home on North Street caught fire last Tuesday morning. The fire, according to Fire Chief Mervin Palmerton, started in the living room of the house, probably from defective electrical wiring. The interior of the house was completely destroyed, with furniture and other household goods going up in flames.

Fast action by the Arcade Fire Department prevented the outside of the house from catching fire. The roof, although burned slightly, was not completely destroyed. No one was injured as the Close family was out of town at the time of the fire. The blaze took about an hour and a half for firemen to bring under control.

Broken Water Main In Arcade Causes Brief Shut-Off

Nov. 19—Village water and highway crews worked from 1:00 a. m. Sunday morning until 1:00 p. m. Sunday afternoon repairing a broken water main which at one time threatened to undermine the street near the intersection of East Main and Sanford avenues. The 6-inch diameter cast iron line was found to be broken off and it was reported that water pouring out of the break came up through the pavement as far away as the post office. The trouble is believed to have been caused by the pounding of heavy traffic or slight ground movement in the area.

The pavement cover over the pipe and the large amount of water flowing away in several directions made it difficult to find the exact location of the break, according to Village authorities. The workmen had to break through blacktop pavement, old brick pavement, and several inches of concrete foundation in order to expose the pipe and perform the necessary repairs.

Water service was off for a short interval in the East Main Street area while a repair clamp was installed over the broken section.

New Organ to Be Dedicated at Holland Baptist Church Sunday

Leitchworth Park Ends Record Season

Nov. 26—Leitchworth State Park had a record attendance of 505,000 this year.

The park's 81 camping cabins, now closed for the season, were used a record 34,700, patron days.

In addition, campers stayed in the park a record 11,500 camper days. Cabin reservations for the 1960 season will not be accepted until January 15, 1960.

While Gen Iris Inn, the Museum, and all major facilities, including comfort stations, will be closed November 2 for the winter months, the Falls Area of the Park will be open and the public will continue to be welcomed.

Regular park entrances may, at times, be blocked by snow, but a "winter entrance," extending to the Park from Route 19A between Castile and Portageville, will be plowed and maintained at all times for the benefit of park visitors.

Five Lettermen Return to ACS Basketball Squad

Nov. 26—The Arcade Central School basketball team opens their 1959-60 season tonight as they take off for the ACS gym. Five returning lettermen and a strong group of JV players from last year give this year's squad a solid nucleus on which to start.

Bob Hyman heads the list of returning lettermen. Hyman was the big gun for the club last year, tossing in 187 points, 200 rebounds and a shooting percentage of 43%. At the club in all departments, Hyman is also back. Out of four games last year, Meyerhoff neverless scored 87 points and grabbed 119 rebounds. He will be counted on greatly to give Hyman rebound support as well as guide the team point wise. The other forward spot will be filled by Jerry Fox, also a returning letterman. Jerry played excellent ball all last year and should improve this year as the season wears on. Dave Garlapo is the only non-lettermen to make the starting team. Dave, who played JV ball most of last year, is greatly improved and will be counted on as a player. The other guard spot will be filled by Tom May, a letterman from last year. Tom, although shorter than most, still was a necessary cog in last year's machine. His ball handling ability put him near the top in assists for the team. Ed Walter is also a returning letterman, although he isn't on the starting five. Donald Hamm will also be back as able reserve strength at the center post.

Four players are up from the JV team and should make their appearance felt before the season is over. Jack Fries is up after a hot year on the JV's. His 145 points topped all scorers while his 70 rebounds also helped. Paul Hecht should add rebounding strength if nothing else. Paul nabbed 129 rebounds for top honors in last year's department and tossed in 104 points to boot. Ronnie Belden and Doug Moore have also moved up after successful season last year.

Coach Maurice Hickey predicted an excellent year for the team. He said that this year's team is a better one than he had last year. Barring injuries to key players, the team could go all the way.

Hugh Wilson Selected to Furnish Communications in Time of Emergency

Nov. 26—Hugh Wilson, R.F.D. 2, Arcade, has been selected to set up an organization of Wyoming County amateur radio operators prepared to furnish organized emergency communication in time of disaster.

Mr. Wilson's assignment, which carries the title of Emergency Coordinator, is to band together members of the amateur radio service in his community to perfect arrangements for emergency radio communication by horns in time of disasters. In addition to the use of normal station equipment working from commercial power, amateur stations use self-powered radio transmitting and receiving equipment as needed.

Mr. Wilson as an Emergency Coordinator will call together local meetings of amateurs, establish common operating procedures, and arrange regular drill periods when the ham's personal stations may be mobilized under simulated emergency conditions.

Paul V. Galvin Founder of Motorola, Board Chairman, Dies

Nov. 12—Paul V. Galvin of Chicago, Ill., Chairman of the Board and founder of Motorola, died last Thursday at the age of 64.

Mr. Galvin entered the business world at the age of 12 with a popcorn business which he carried on from a wagon built of parts obtained from a blacksmith shop. He attended the University of Illinois and when World War I came was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Third Division.

After working with storage battery firms at the conclusion of the war, he decided to open a company of his own. With his brother and \$65 he organized the Galvin Manufacturing Company in Chicago, but the product, a battery eliminator, became obsolete.

It was then that request for a radio to be installed in an automobile, started the firm on the road to success. From this came Motorola, now one of the world's largest manufacturers in the electronic field.
