20-Day Sentence Given Man Making Suicide Attempt

An attempt to take his life over last week cost Bruce O. Pletz, 35, of 420 West Union St., a term of 20 days in Wayne County jail, following his four-day stay in Newark Hospital recovering from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Pletz, who unsuccessfully tried to commit suicide with a 22-caliber rifle in the Garlock Hardware Corp. store here last Thursday afternoon, narrowly escaping a policeman with the bullet, drew the 20-day sentence after being arraigned before Police Justice James D. Hurley on Monday. He pleaded guilty to a charge of discharging firearms in a public place.

Questioned by Judge Hurley, the man said his act had been prompted by disappointment in the affair. Police said Pletz is an extracts salesman, frequented the store to examine the gun, while the backs of Ray Wilson, manager, and Ray Bradley, clerk, were turned, slipped a cartridge from his pocket into the gun and fired at his chest.

The bullet crashed through a glass show window and missed hitting Traffic Officer William Scheerens, who was passing, and Lyman-Croth-Grace Ave., who was five feet behind Scheerens. Rushed to the hospital, he was treated by Dr. D. F. Johnson, who said the bullet had glanced off the man and emerged under the right arm. On release from the hospital, he was arrested by policeman Irving Clark and released.
