

EGG DISHES, CHEESE AID IN ECONOMY

High in food value, eggs and cheese provide the base for many delicious and economical dishes. Here are some tasty varieties.

EGGS GOLDENROD

2 to 4 hard cooked eggs
1 cup medium white sauce
4 slices toast
Salt to taste
Pinch paprika
Chop the egg whites fine, add to the sauce and season to taste. Arrange 3 slices of toast on the egg serving dish and pour the egg mixture over them. Sprinkle with egg yolks which have been pressed through a sieve. Garnish with parsley and toast points made from the remaining slice of toast.

NOODLE RING

1 hot noodle cooked in salted water
5 eggs beaten
1 pint cream
Pinch salt
Put in aluminum mold and set in a pan of water and bake for 1 1/2 hours. Unmold and fill center with creamed mushrooms, spinach or creamed sea food.

BAKED CORN AND RICE

2 cups canned corn
4 egg yolks beaten
2 cups steamed cooked rice
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1 cup grated cheese
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper sauted in 4 table-spoons butter
2 tablespoons chopped onion.
Bake in an uncovered casserole for 30 minutes in a moderate oven.

EGGS AND CHEESE ON TOAST

4 hard cooked eggs
3 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon celery seed
2 cups milk
1/4 cup grated cheese
1 raw egg
Melt butter, add flour, paprika and celery salt. Add milk and cook until mixture is creamy. Add cheese and beat until the cheese has melted. Add eggs, cooked, minced and uncooked egg. Cook one minute and serve on hot toast.

EGGS AND MUSHROOMS

Whites of 6 hard cooked eggs chopped and six large mushrooms of equal of small ones. Make a rich white sauce. Add the egg and mushrooms. Cook 5 minutes. Place on rounds of toast. Put yolks through ricer on top of each.

BUTTERED BAKED BEETS

6 beets cooked
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons sugar
1 table-spoon vinegar
Cut beets in 1/2 inch slices. Melt butter in a baking dish. Mix butter, add sugar and vinegar. Allow mixture to come to the boiling point. Pour syrup over beets and bake for 10 minutes.

STUFFED TURNIPS

Wash, pare and boil medium sized turnips leaving them whole. When tender, drain and cut a thin slice off the top of each turnip. Scoop out making a shell. Fill with bread stuffing made as for chicken. Cover opening with slice cut from top and bake, basting with hot fat.

POTATOES WITH CAPER SAUCE

6 cooked potatoes
2 table-spoons chopped parsley
1 table-spoon capers
1 table-spoon caper juice
2 table-spoons ground onions
4 table-spoons melted butter
Juice 1/2 lemon
2 table-spoons grated cheese
1 table-spoon salt
1/2 table-spoon pepper
Mix ingredients except onions and pour over potatoes. Add onion just before serving.

MARIONI AND PINEAPPLE

2 cups macaroni
4 slices cooked pineapple
6 table-spoons grated cheese
1 thin slice bacon
1 table-spoon salt
Cook macaroni in salt water. Drain, drain and place in buttered bake dish with alternate layers of cheese and half the macaroni. On top layer place pineapple rings and bacon. Bake for one hour, then uncover and brown.

CHEESE SAUCE

2 table-spoons butter
3 table-spoons flour
2 cups milk
1/2 cup cheese
1 table-spoon salt
1 table-spoon Worcestershire sauce
1 table-spoon mustard
1 table-spoon paprika
Melt butter, add flour and cook until thick. Add milk, stir until thick, add cheese and seasonings. Stir until cheese melts.

COTTAGE CHEESE

1 pint tall cans evaporated milk
Add six table-spoons vinegar. Let stand five minutes. Add one quart boiling water and let stand 10 minutes. Then strain and season.
