## Farm, Home Question Box

Q—My cow is very much bothered by horseflies at this time of the year, and has to be kept in the barn most of the time while the grass in the pasture goes to seed. How can I destroy these pests or what spray can I use to repel them?

A—No fly spray that I know of is much good for a repellent for more than a few minutes. Make a thin muslin blanket for the cow as a fly net and rub her legs and exposed parts every 2 or 3 days with a rag or brush moistened in crude petroleum.

Q—Where are the nests of these flies, in the ground or elsewhere?

A—There are many different kinds of flies and most of them breed in manure or fish of some sort. I suspect these are the "Ox Warble" fly and they live in the cow. The eggs are licked off the hair of the legs and in the course of the year work from the stomach, through the tissues and finally emerge as big grubs from the ridge of the back. Brushing the legs and chest every three or four days with crude oil or kerosene kills the eggs before the cow gets a chance to swallow them.

Q—What is the rental of good soil per acre?

A—Whatever you can get—roughly, I would say \$5.00 an acre is about right for fairly good crop land.

Q—What will keep grass from growing in gravel walk and driveway?

A—Burn it off periodically with a fire torch or spray of weed killer and apply crank case oil, sodium chlorate or calcium chlorate once in a while.

Q—I have an excellent Guernsey cow, entitled to register, and giving 50 pounds of milk per day. I wanted to keep her calf when she freshened, but she had twins, both heifers. Is it true that twin heifers do not make good cows?
