Taber Announces Vacancy for U. S. Military Academy

Congressman John Taber of Auburn today announced that there will be a vacancy for the 36th Congressional District for entrance to the U. S. Military Academy at West Point in 1941. A competitive examination for the appointment is to be held on Saturday, October 5, 1940, under the direction of the U. S. Civil Service Commission for the purpose of selecting the principal and alternate candidates for this vacancy.
The examination is open to any young man who is a resident of the 36th District, comprising the counties of Cayuga, Hamilton, Seneca, Wayne and Yates. The candidates must be between the ages of 17 and 22 years as of the date of entrance to the Academy—about July 1, 1941—in order to qualify for entrance.
The examination on October 5 starts at 9 a. m. and will be held in the Post Office buildings of the following towns: Auburn, Canandaigua, Geneva, Seneca Falls, Lyons, Newark and Penn Yan.
Those wishing to take the examination should communicate with Congressman Taber, Auburn, giving him their full name, place of residence, and date and place of birth as soon as possible.

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FAIR PLANS 'FARM WEEK'

Farm and rural people from all parts of the State will head for the New York World's Fair on August 16 to participate in "Farm Week." According to Herbert P. King of Trumansburg, president of the New York State Farm Bureau Federation, the low cost tour will probably be the last one to be operated to the World's Fair by the farm bureau.
Joining in this event are 4-H boys and girls from all parts of the State. "Farm Week" at the fair is especially designed for farm folks, and the fair management has made available special admission prices and many special features have been arranged for entertainment of guests, according to the farm bureau president.

Potato Pie
