Newark Elks Lodge will definitely sponsor a professional basketball team here this winter. This was the announcement made by Raymond L. Wilson, excited ruler, this week following final decision of lodge trustees in the matter which has been under discussion the past two months.

Wilson said that Herbert M. Alexander has been named as general manager of the project, with Albert (Chris) Rooker again serving as bookie manager and Ted Beales, former Antler coach and player, assisting to act as team coach this year. Decision to go ahead with the annual Saturday night pro contests was finally made, Wilson asserted, when the basketball committee was convinced that a large enough number of people wanted the entertainment to assure the financial support necessary. He declared that the Elks have, over a period of years, lost rather than made money on the project, and that last season was no exception.

Manager Alexander immediately said the Elks will attempt to start up a basketball pro cages immediately and form an independent Newark club rather than the proposed plan of hiring an outside team to come here and play under the Antler banner. He said the team will probably perform here every Saturday night against the usual top-ranking pro teams.

Rooker announced that the first game has been scheduled here for Saturday night Dec. 2 against the Harlem Yankees. He said contract offers have been sent to Tommy Rich and Frank Frantel, regular and standout players here last year. Ed Noland, Tonawanda, who was here last year, and Dick Rucka, Utica, who saw brief service with the Elks last year, are center who's playing here will be coached here and who's now coaching at Cretle after playing college ball, and Johnny Schroeder, ex-Syracuse varsity sparker now in Colgate-Rochester Divinity School. He said that several other men including Ed Sonderman were also considered for the position.

First rehearsal of the club will be held this Saturday night.

Highlights of the past regular week in the Wayne County Bowling League included establishment of a new high single-game mark by two men in the same match, a general improvement in individual scores throughout the loop, and continued rise of Newark Elks, who increased their leading margin to 13 total points with their 10th sweep of the season.

Prime eddy was turned in a match between Wolcott Foodhavers and Ontario Partidges, when George Longley, "Havens" captain, and Keat Gardner of Partidges both split the sides for new high singles of 248, topping the former mark of 246. Longley hit his in the first game but fell down thereafter to register only 577, while Gardner started with a low pair and then bombed out the big score in the final line, for a total of 566. The two teams split in points.

Perduyn Leads Antlers

Newark's Antlers, spotted Lyons Holloways 95 pins on handicap and still shelled out victories by good margins in all games and total pins to remain unbeaten in any match this year. "Chub" Perduyn hit 514 and scored out games of 199-191-219 for high total of 609, while Capt. Ted Beales had a 204 single and 533 total and Ed Farrell added with 541.

Bilottas relinquished their struggle hold on second place and fell into a tie with Clyde Shell as the locals could do no better than split with the 12th place Sodas Atlantics. Scoring the highest team average at the league, 884, the Poppers had to give away 85 pins and lost the first line by 28 pins the third by only 4. NHS Five Rises to Trounce Penn Yan After Opening Loss

Newark High School's Red cage forces initiated their new gymnasium by taking a defeat from Waterloo last Friday, but came back greatly improved Tuesday night to fight their way to a convincing 34-25 triumph over Penn Yan and gain an even split in their two Wayne-Finger Lakes League titles to date. Tomorrow (Friday) night they face the third loop test, against Mynderse Academy at Seneca Falls, then point to the traditional clash at Lyons Dec. 6 in the first contest toward the Wayne Class A flag.

The shaky and inexperienced Redmen could not cope with the veteran Waterloo boys and needed themselves out of chances for victory. Tuesday night Referee Manny Hirsch called 20 personals against the locals, one more than they had in the opener, but they were not the violent type as committed against Waterloo to prevent scoring. George Quinn, high scorer in both contests with 15 and 14 markers, showed speed and skill, while Kenny Huebeler and Sumner Munn exhibited marked improvement in the second tilt. Capt. Jim Hart played two and a half quarters and, although not up to his old scoring form, contributed passing assists in the late minutes to set up the winning goals.

Quinn Sparks Attack

Both clubs racked up six points in the first quarter, after they had played nearly five minutes without any scoring. It was a wild and loose game, with Newark setting a fast pace that had the Penn Yanners off balance. Quinn contributed a pair of pop-ups and a free throw in the second period to lead the Reds to a 12-7 edge at half-time, while the visitors were held to a single foul counter.

Huebeler opened the second half with a pair of nice side shots that swished in and Quinn added a corner flip that sent the Hatsmen out in front 19 to the three-quarter mark. After Whittaker's field goal and foul were the only Penn Yan points, Quinn's pretty short flip and a long dribble-in conversion started the final stanza merrily for the winners, then Penn Yan began to creep up on two long shots each by Fox and Whittaker.

Hart-to-Munn Play Checks

But Sumner Munn showed his ability under the boards by taking three nice passes from Hart to toss them up for two-pointers. Hart finally caged a corner pop and as the final gong sounded Brunt's lay-up had pulled the invaders to within 9 points of the locals. Ray Lyon, lanky Red forward, was forced to watch from the bench after spraining his ankle Monday, an injury which will keep him out until at least the Lyons contest.

Newark had 20 personal fouls and Penn Yan 15 called during the melee, with the Reds sinking 9 out of 16 attempts, and Penn Yan making good on 11 out of 23 free throws. Munn and Huebeler were forced out in the fourth quarter on fouls, as were also Barrows and Hyland of the visitors.

The second team dropped both its opening games. Waterloo captured a narrow 31-28 win and Penn Yan took away a 30-21 victory.
