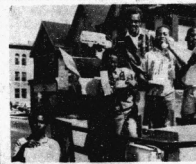

The comedy evening July 12th at Kleinhans Music Hall, Buffalo's finest, will present "The Migrants".

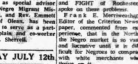

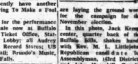
