Auto Racing's "Triple Crown"



The two newest entries forming the United States Auto Club's \$2,000,000-plus "Triple Crown" have waded into the time in rivalling the top-end action of the grand-daddy of them all, the Indianapolis 500. In 60 years of competition at Indy, the closest finish came in 1937 when Wilbur Shaw, a three-time winner, edged Ralph Hepburn by 2.16 seconds.

The California 500 had a Hollywood finish in its first year — 1970 — when Jim McWhinch beat Art Pollard to the checkered flag by 0.75 seconds.

The "Triple Crown" became a reality in 1971 with the inclusion of the Schaefer 500 at Pocono International Raceway in Pennsylvania. Like the California race, the Schaefer 500 opened on an exciting note before 37,000 fans with native son Mark Donohue nipping Joe Leonard in the closing laps for a 1.82 second win.

DEDICATION OF F. DOUGLASS HOME IN D. C.

ORANGE — Dr. A. J. Z. Walker, professor of English and director of the Black Studies Program at the State University College of Arts and Sciences in Orange, was invited by the Secretary of the University to attend the dedication of the Frederick Douglass Home in Washington, D. C., on Feb. 10. Frederick Douglass, a ruf-

away slave from Maryland, became one of the leading abolitionists in the 19th century. His "American Journey" in the mid-nineteenth century, from 1845 to the Civil War, he spent in Europe. He was a powerful orator and a skilled writer. During the Civil War he served as an advisor to various Union and British officials. He was the first African American to be elected to the United States Congress in 1862. He died in 1895.



Among the many guests held by the Douglass Home on the 50th Plover (1930) built, William Carter in Washington City, Japan, is among the best preserved. Occupying an area of about 100 acres, it contains six parks, five rivers and a "floating garden" — an exhibit because it presents different views on one stretch along. A characteristic of such a garden is that it allows visitors to follow the surrounding. One can see many and nature which is seen moving through a garden of time. Through the appreciation of the varied signs in the garden, one is led to greater depths of understanding. The garden reminds of the architectural beauty of the garden, the New Moore Bridge (Miami): Bath is the most famous.
