"I would not leave Khartoum if I could," wrote the heroic Gordon about a month before his death. If ever this world had a true knight it was in this man who was needlessly sacrificed by the culpable neglect and hesitancy of an indecisive ministry.

It is openly stated that there are only two banking institutions in New York whose recommendations have any weight with English investors, and these two are really branches of London firms. The shameless way foreign stockholders and capitalists have been treated in this country has inspired them with such a well founded suspicion of everything American that they are dropping our securities as quickly as they can find something that promises fair return and square dealing elsewhere.

One of the most overworked and poorly paid classes of men in our country is the car drivers of New York city. He works sixteen hours a day, exposed to all sorts of weather, is compelled to stand most of the time, has no regular hour for meals, and all for the mere pittance of \$1.75 per day, -barely sufficient for his own support to say nothing of the family usually dependent upon him. The surface roads are all paying handsome dividends, and surely public sympathy will be on the side of the men in their efforts for an increase of wages, which they propose to obtain by striking on April 1st, unless employers reduce the number of hours to twelve and raise their wages to \$2.50 a day.

Who will succeed Mr. Bowen, is a question that is now being asked with considerable interest in political circles. There is no scarcity of candidates for the senatorship - of course all from this county as it belongs to Essex this year. First and foremost, to be sure, is Ticonderoga's candidate, Mr. B. W. Burleigh. Beside him are mentioned the names of Hon. N. C. Boynton, who should have been speaker of the Assembly this year. Hon. J. W. Steele, the able chairman of the Board of Supervisors these many years, and Hon. W. F. Weston of Wilmington. The backwoods are yet to be heard from which doubtless will turn out a lot of statesmen willing to sacrifice themselves to serve their country by wearing the toga.

An Ohio tramp saved a whole train load of people from destruction, last week, by remaining near a broken rail for over an hour in the freezing open air to signal the train. His noble action was suitably rewarded. Many people seem to think that only the lowest of low are found among this class of restless humanity. Such is a mistaken idea. Newspaper men know from experience that some of the best compositors and brightest intellects are of the itinerant order, and the same is true of other callings no doubt. The very overflow of brain force often drives men to this life. To be sure the life they lead is not conducive to moral development, yet many of the poor fellows are only enemies to themselves and their faults, like those of poor Burns, are "all of the flesh - none of the spirit." Many of them have been and can be reclaimed to a life of industry and usefulness by a very little effort.

A very able and scholarly rebuke to those fulsome and injudicious worshippers of Shakespeare, who hold him, as the Germans were once said to do, to be infallible, is found in the current number of the Century from the pen of Mr. O. B. Frothingham. He concludes an attempt to assign the Bard of Avon his true place among the "makers" thus: "He will be the favorite of the vigorous and the bright-hearted, but not the companion of the solitary or the oracle of the sage; a rank, luxuriant creature who warbled his native wood-notes wild, but hardly an authority for the theologian, or a pattern for saintly souls. It is easy to concede his supremacy in his sphere. It is difficult to grant he was the poet of all time, or of the upper regions of space. To literary men he must always be dear on account of the brilliancy of his style, the terseness of his sentences, the variety and aptness of his illustrations, the momentum and the beauty of his expression; but to purely spiritual insight he will ever seem defective."
