

### New Span Discussed

The feasibility of replacing the "paper mill bridge" and methods of financing the project, if attempted, was discussed at the March meeting of the Harrisville Area Chamber of Commerce.

The bridge has been condemned and closed on orders of the Lewis County Highway superintendent, a move that has caused concern in the immediate vicin-

ity. The cost of replacing the bridge has been estimated at \$36,000.

Harrisville Mayor Roswell A. Cring and Diana Supervisor Lawrence G. Malbut reported studies are being made as to the possibilities of obtaining state and federal aid for such a project. They expect to have a report for the April 19 meeting. Election of officers will also be held on that date.



### Conservation Corner

Regular contributors to this column are the four conservation-oriented agencies in Lowville: A.S.C.S., Department of Environmental Conservation, Extension Service and Soil Conservation Service. This week's column comes from the Soil Conservation Service.

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Your Soil and Water Conservation District. What is it? What can it do for you? Is it a new government agency? In this Conservation Corner we'll try to give you a better understanding of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, the role of the Soil Conservation Service and especially acquaint you with the Lewis County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Conservation Districts cover more than 95% of the agricultural land of the United States. Since the first districts were organized in 1937 they have been an effective means for individuals and communities to deal with local soil and water conservation problems.

The Lewis County Soil and Water Conservation District began operation in 1947. Like all such districts, it is a unit of local government and not a branch or agency of the federal government. In this way, the District Program can be geared to working with soil and water conservation problems of Lewis County.

Each District is directed by a board of local people, usually resident landowners or operators who are elected locally or designated by the Lewis County Board of Supervisors. The District has a five-man board of directors.

ectors. One director represents Farm Bureau, one represents Grange, one is an at-large member and two are county legislators.

This board decides upon the District Program, arranges for assistance to put its program into effect, and directs the use of this assistance to landowners and operators who need it.

The U.S.D.A. Soil Conservation Service provides technical assistance to districts under formal agreements. A District Conservationist and a Conservation Technician of the S.C.S. provide technical assistance to landowners of Lewis County through the Lewis District.

What can the Lewis County Soil and Water Conservation District do for you? Here are some of the services available.

1. Detailed soil map with soil texture, color and interpretations for various uses.
2. Information about the different safe and uses and adapted crops (including grasses, trees, and wildlife) for each kind of soil on your land.
3. Consultation with a professional soil conservationist to help you make a conservation plan for your property.
4. Technical services as needed to design, lay out, and check construction of soil and water conservation practices such as drainage, ponds, diversion ditches, etc. Plus many more.

If you are a landowner or operator and you have any soil or water conservation problems on your property the Lewis County Soil and Water Conservation District is here to help you. Our office is at 7625 State Street in Lowville and our phone number is 376-6122.

There is no charge for technical services provided by the District.

#### Attends Conference

He reported that educators have agreed the funeral director's role of serving the living, and that funeral service offers a real opportunity to young people who desire a career of helping others. The funeral director licensing law now requires a two-year combined course at a State or community college, or one year in an accredited college or university, and a year in an approved funeral director school.
