TURIN - Amy Austin, Turin, has recently been assigned to the Viet Nam Branch of the Mycilio Bible Translators. Over 2,500 members from 20 countries make up WBT. Their goal is to translate the New Testament into the languages of tribes and minority groups in some 23 countries. Many of these groups have no written literature. So a translator must first learn the language. While translating the Bible, other tasks keep him busy. He must write papers about various aspects of each language. He must train teachers of reading. He must stimulate tribespeople to write their own literature.

Translators are aided in their work by printers, secretaries, buyers, pilots, teachers and many other members of Wycliffe, called support personnel.

The Viet Nam Branch, in existence since 1957, has 61 members and works in 21 languages, including one in Cambodia. They have been much encouraged in their work by seeing tribespeople become Christians and grow as they read God's Word. Miss Austin plans to join them in November. Until then she will be at home.

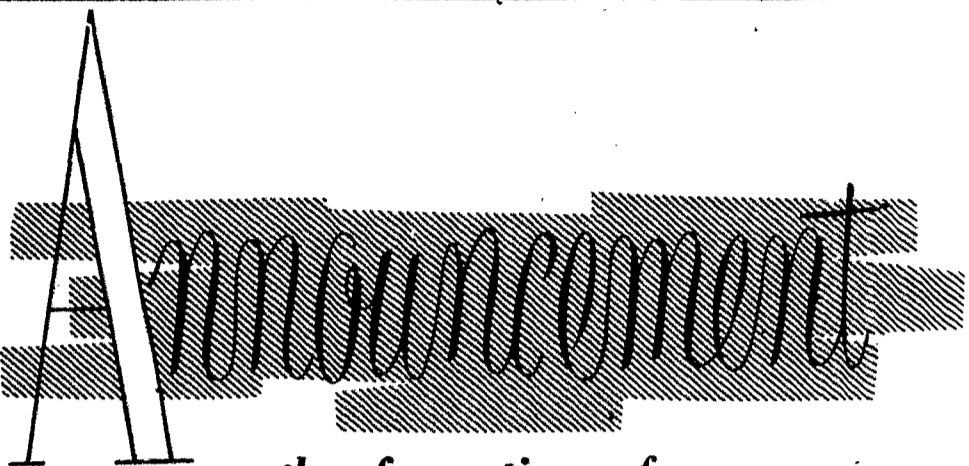

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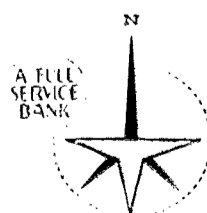
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
