Drug abusers, in the beginning, are impelled by curiosity to experiment. Their friends or drug sellers tell them to expect an increase in their mental ability. This very rarely occurs. Instead, drugs become a means of escaping from life's problems. Then, the drug becomes his greatest problem.
If a drug abuser is fortunate enough to not yet get "hooked" on the addictive drugs, he has more hope of escape from serious harm. Smoking Marijuana or sniffing glue can be easily stopped if he wants to try. The odds are much greater against stopping, if he has become addicted to Heroin or the Barbiturates.
