Mrs. Chartrand, top center, a native of Lowville, was graduated from Potsdam and has been employed as a fifth grade teacher for twenty-one years. She taught previously in the Indian River School system. Mrs. Chartrand and her husband, Pete, have three children.

Mr. Duffo, top right, has taught math at Lowville Academy for thirty-four years. He taught in rural schools for nine years previous and was active in coaching for many years at the academy. Mr. Duffo and his wife, Dorothy, live on Water Street, in Lowville.

## Lack Of Bids LACS Problem

Lowville Academy and Central School Board considered new problems at its meeting on July 23, as it was reported that no bids were offered to provide fuel oil, liquefied fuel gas, or meat for the school for the coming year. Complaints that have bid in the past cited uncertainty as to prices as their reason for failure to submit proposals to the board. The administration was given authority to re-advertise.

Mrs. Robert Lynch presided throughout the meeting. Bids were accepted and contracts awarded to V.S. Virkler and Son for snow plowing; to Water-Frozen Foods for fish; and to Rossdale Farms for milk. The 1968 Station wagon which has been replaced with a new car purchased under state contract was sold to the highest bidder, Patrick McGrath. Michael Doney of Lowville was the high bidder for a whirlpool bath which can no longer be used by school personnel.

In other action, the board appointed five new teachers. David Eisesh, currently on military leave of absence, was reappointed to a mathematics position. He taught in Lowville for two years before joining the Air Force. A native of the Buffalo area, Mr. Eisesh was graduated from McKendree College and has done graduate work at Plattburgh. He is married and has one child, Miss Nancy Connell of Troy was appointed to an English position. She was graduated from the College of St. Rose, earned a master's degree at the University of Chicago, and has done additional graduate work at the State University at Albany. For a year and a half she worked for a publishing firm, and this spring she taught seventh grade English in Troy.

Miss Linda Leichtweis of Lowville was appointed to a position in Scholastic, Mr. Keyser was state office of the F.F.A. He grew up on a dairy farm.

1972 and 4,000 in 1973; Friday, 7,000 in 1972 and 4,500 in 1973; Saturday, 1,000 in 1972 and 9,500 in 1973.

According to Mr. Woolshlager, a preliminary accounting seemed to indicate that overall receipts of the fair were way up, although there were extra expenses this year due to the improvement of the gates, fencing, etc.

He said that a total of \$10,000 was given in premiums, of which \$6,000 will be reimbursed by the state.

Beryl W. Freeman, was in charge of organizing the exposition this year, stated that overall the fair appeared to be one of the biggest successes in its history. He said that the entertainment was excellent this year, which seemed to encourage larger crowds.

According to Mr. Woolshlager, the only readjustment of the fair was Friday, Grange Day, in which attendance was down about 4,500. The entertainment on the bill that day was a gospel singing group, which failed to attract the anticipated crowd, he said.
