RECIPE OF THE WEEK
Cherry Blossom Bread
1 8 oz. jar maraschino cherries, drained (reserve juice).
Line 9 x 5 inch loaf pan with waxed paper and water to cherry juice to make 1 cup liquid (chop cherries).

In large bowl, place 2 cups sifted flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons sugar, stir together, then make hole in center - add chopped cherries, 1 egg (beaten slightly with fork) 1/3 cup cooled, melted lard or oil, and 1/2 cup chopped walnuts.

Four or five with 1 cup liquid, and stir only, until mixed. Pour into lined pan, let stand 30 minutes. Bake 350 degrees 50 to 60 minutes, or until done. -Ruby Tithany Woelke

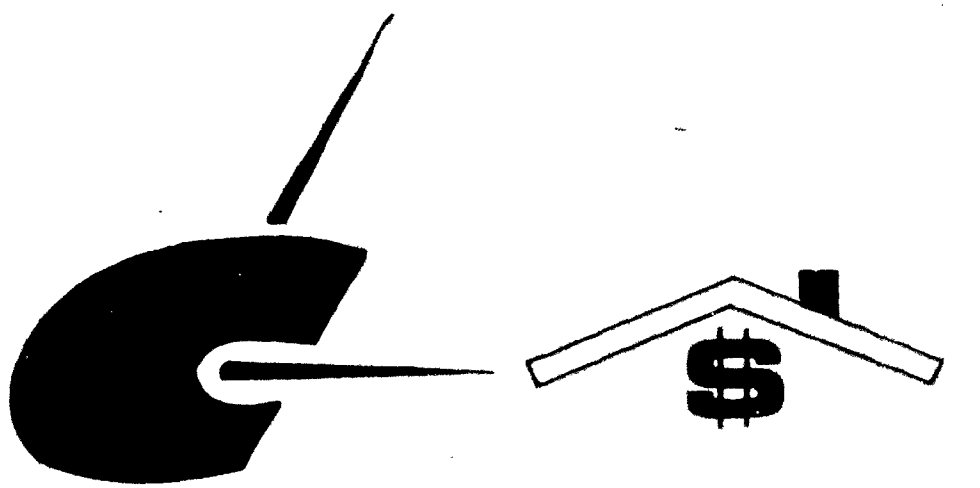

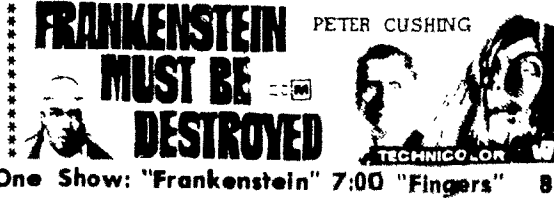
