### Emergency First Aid

The November meeting of the Lewis County Search and Rescue Service, Inc., was held on November 8 at the New Bremen Community Center. Robert O'Brien, first aid training officer, reported on the new American Red Cross First Aid courses that will be come effective in 1975. The courses will be much more detailed than the present courses and should prepare the first aider to better handle emergency situations.

Chief Howard Janak reported that the Search and Rescue Service had been called to assist in the search for a lost hiker in the Tag Hill sector on the opening day of the season.

Discussion was held on colors to wear while in the woods. Blaze orange or yellow is best because it can be easily seen by searchers.

It was noted that at the October meeting an extension of ten days was voted

to provide time for negotiations with the Town of Lowville, and others, regarding the proposed ambulance service. Lowville had rejected the contract for various reasons even after other towns had agreed to sign. It was reported that during the ten-day period nothing was heard from the towns even though the Search and Rescue Service had informed them in writing of the points they were willing to discuss.

One member present stated that it appeared that "the Town of Lowville was not interested in the volunteer ambulance service and would rather pay more for a commercial ambulance service from outside the area."

Following the regular meeting, Robert Bailey, district forest ranger, conducted a session on search organization that has been adopted by the Department of Environmental Conservation for state-wide use. As the plan is used through out the state volunteer search teams can be called in and will all follow a standard organization and search procedure.

The next meeting will be Monday, Dec. 9, at 8 p.m., at the Martinsburg Fire Hall.

### Maintenance Tips

Before operating your snowmobile this winter, Champion suggests your dealer perform the following basic maintenance.

1. Inspect the track for proper tension.
2. Clean and adjust the carburetor to manufacturer's specifications.
3. Adjust the timing to manufacturer's specifications.
4. Clean the gas filter.
5. Check the exhaust ports to see that they are not plugged with residue.
6. Check all drive belts for wear.

7. Check the spark plug wire for signs of deterioration and tightness of connection.

8. Install a new spark plug of the recommended type for the engine and operating conditions. Do not put it in so tight that you damage the threads in the head.

9. If your engine has a battery, make sure the electrolyte level is up. Also, check battery cables and posts for condition and tighten connections.

10. Spare spark plugs should be kept in a clean container or wrapped in rags to prevent oil and dirt from contaminating the plug's surface.

### 4 Sentenced By Court

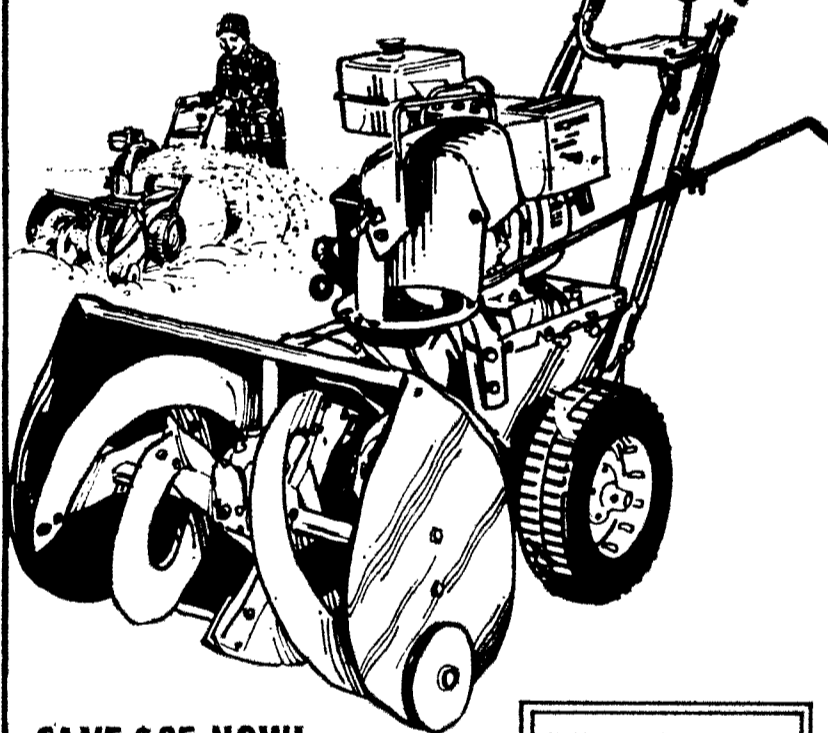

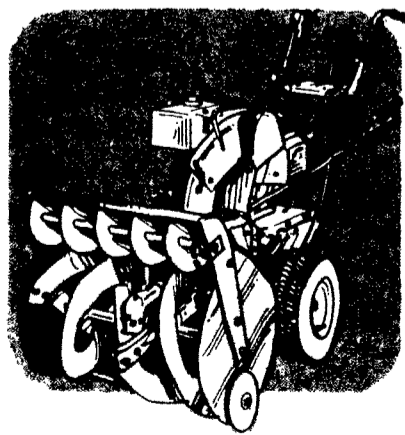

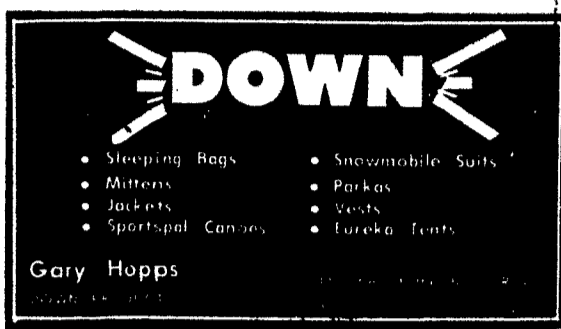

### Diet Workshop

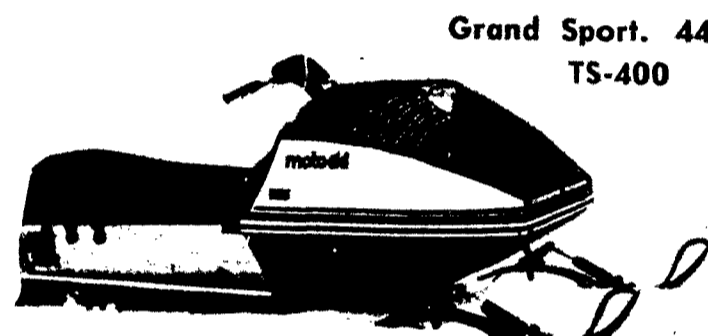

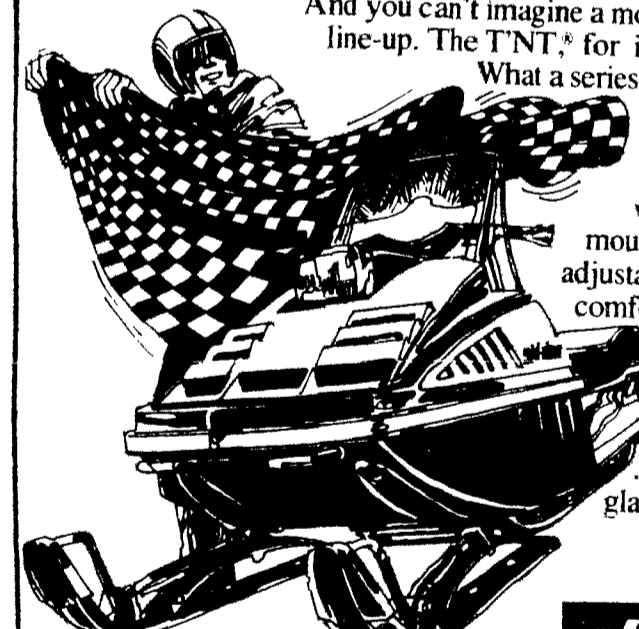
